Our focus remains the same as it was when we first started; finding and helping animals with the greatest need on both sides of the border. However, because of your support, our overall impact has grown tremendously.

Our veterinary wellness and spay and neuter clinics in the U.S. and Mexico brought access to care to over 6,000 animals living in poverty last year. Our rescue efforts saved the lives of over 600 homeless dogs. That is twice as many animals as we were able to reach last year!

It is you, our community of compassion, that makes this a reality for these animals. You save these lives. You bring these animals care. You enable us to change their worlds for the better.

As we look toward the next year, our focus remains fixed on striking at the root causes of animal homelessness and suffering, all the while saving as many lives as we possibly can. 
She spent several months recovering in foster and is now a 60-pound young dog who is thriving with her new adopter, a District Attorney in northern California.

STRIKING AT THE ROCTS



Wellness Clinics in Underserved Communities

Problem: Lack of access to basic veterinary care in impoverished communities on both sides of the border leads to animals suffering from preventable disease and parasitism, and languishing with chronic health issues.

Owners are often forced to give up an animal they love due to an inability to pay for the rising cost of even the most basic veterinary care, contributing to overcrowding in shelters and depriving that animal of an otherwise loving home.

Solution: Our free clinics in underserved communities provide these animals with the access to care they need to thrive and remain with the families who love them.

Spay/Neuter

Problem: Lack of access to affordable spay/neuter in impoverished communities leads to accidental litters and backyard breeding. This is a primary source of unwanted animals in the communities we serve.

Solution: We opened our stationary spay/neuter clinic in Mexico last year and also launched an innovative sterilization program in one of the most underserved communities in the U.S., addressing the root cause of animal homelessness in the areas we serve.





TO SAVE A LIFE IS TO SAVE A WORLD

Dog Rescue

Problem: Dogs living in poverty on both sides of the border often languish on the streets or find themselves in overcrowded shelters with no chance at adoption.

Solution: Rescue

Mexico

We rescue homeless dogs in Mexico, rehabilitate them medically and emotionally, and then transport them to safety in northern California where they are very quickly adopted out into loving homes.

Central Valley

We rescue Chihuahuas from overcrowded shelters in the Central Valley of California, where euthanasia rates are alarmingly high, and transport them to a partner shelter in Minneapolis where small dogs are in high demand.

We also rescue additional dogs from this region and transport them to areas in northern California where there are shortages of adoptable dogs.
